# Equity Strategic Plan 2025 - 2027

## Vision

- All patients and caregivers receive equitable care.
- Practices are safe and inclusive for all patients, caregivers, and staff.
- Inclusion of access to care and equity metrics in key quality indicators.
- A culture of interprofessional development is the norm.
- Patient and caregiver voices are elevated at each practice.
- MOQC takes a comprehensive, community-driven, and flexible approach to identify, prevent, and eliminate the root causes of disparities.

### Enhancing Community Engagement in Cancer Care

- Recruit 5 POQC members through relationships with racially/ethnically diverse, disability, veteran, or LGBTQ+ community groups
- 80% of practices collect patient-reported outcomes (PROs) each year
- 50% of practices participate in interprofessional development opportunities for staff to learn about the communities they serve
- \*Develop relationships with 2 community groups to identify community needs, share resources, etc.



### Improving Resources Supporting Accessibility of Cancer Care

- Establish Michigan 2-1-1 referrals at 85% of practices
- Maintain the MOQC resources offered in different languages
- MOQC to create and make available culturally relevant tobacco cessation resources
- 25% of practices participate with YesRx, the statewide non-profit cancer drug repository
- \*Explore the creation of a resource sharing hub, allowing practices to share resources across regions to assist patients in need

### Measuring and Analyzing Cancer Care Equity

- 25% of practices pursue/maintain MOQC Certification
- MOQC to identify and share inequities for each measure using multivariate analysis of data available through the years of collection annually (race, ethnicity, age, gender, disability status, geographic location, and cancer diagnosis)
- Create a MOQC health equity dashboard
- \*Ensure at least one MOQC performance measure is focused on equity



### Building Collaboration Among Cancer Care Teams and Organizations

- Maintain opportunities for check-ins across regions for interdisciplinary health care teams, twice per year
- Increase the number of practices that participate in an initiative focused on meeting patient needs (YesRx, 2-1-1 projects, and Comfort Cuisine)
- Build a network of financial navigators
- \*Build and expand relationships with other collaborative quality initiatives (CQIs) to share best practices
