



the quality of care for patients with cancer across the state. MOQC is supported by Blue Cross Blue

Shield of Michigan (BCRSM) and work is coordinated at the University of Michigan, MOOC focuses or the care of people with cancer, especially those who receive chemotherapy, with or without insurance

MOQC improves care by using data gathered as part of the national Quality Oncology Practice Initiative (QOPI®) program, targeting areas of care that need to get better, and working with medical and

gynecologic oncologists and their teams to make changes in their practices so that care improves

MOOC formed POOC to increase the role of natients, their families or caregivers in the work of our

Consortium. POQC members contribute to the vision and purpose of MOQC by guiding the development of new projects and sharing our work with the community and other interested groups





Oncology Stewardship

A set of coordinated strategies to improve the use of systemic anticancer therapy with the goal of enhancing patient health outcomes while reducing financial toxicity.



Goals of oncology stewardship

1

Identify where therapies add value in the care of patients for specific malignancies 2

Work as a team to evaluate new approvals & decide optimal ways to use

3

Develop & implement evidence-based clinician-driven decision making



Tenets of oncology stewardship



Critically evaluate formulary additions



Facilitate standardization of treatment plans for diseases



Encourage rational use of medications and palliative services



Discuss financial implications of treatment regularly with patients


